Message from the President Surgery in the Time of COVID-19

The past year has been a tumultuous one. The unprecedented disruption effected by the scale of the SARS CoV2 pandemic has not

been kind to the surgical profession. The limited evidence base, lack of resources and rapidly evolving landscape in the early days of the pandemic meant that surgical services and training bore the brunt of redeployment and reallocation policies. Elective lists were drastically cut, and even where some exceptions were made, such as for cancer surgery, patients themselves often refused admission due to fears of COVID-19.

Hands-on training opportunities were significantly reduced, not only as a result of reduced volumes, but in the early days, also due to the need to limit operating theatre presence to specialists, to minimize exposure and utilization of resources such as PPE and blood transfusions Conferences and workshops were postponed, sometimes with significant financial repercussions. The CSAMM's annual congress, which had been scheduled for August 2020, was initially deferred to January 2021, then subsequently cancelled all together, when it became clear the pandemic was not rounding the curve.

Accrual for clinical research was delayed, and qualifying examinations were also postponed, leading to gaps in the surgical service supply chain. Socioeconomic inequities in healthcare were further accentuated, as patients with the means had the option of accessing private healthcare, which were still COVID-free in the initial stages of the pandemic, while those without were at risk for developing the complications of delayed surgery.

During this period, CSAMM sought to support its members through a number of ways. Many of its

members were involved in generating the evidence-base for surgery in the time of COVID-19, either locally or through international collaborations such as the COVIDSurg Collaborative. Practice guidelines, culled from evidence the and evolving best practice recommendations from our own Chapters as well as overseas sister colleges, were speedily developed, thanks to the connectivity afforded by our modern world. Through membership of advocacy groups such as the Malaysian Health Coalition, CSAMM was able to provide meaningful input to the authorities in charge of the pandemic response.

With travel having been severely curtailed, we have had to be creative in maintaining our networking and educational activities. Virtual conferencing platforms received an unexpected boost, as overnight, they became the primary mode of delivery. Interestingly, participation at these virtual conferences did not seem to be adversely affected compared with the conventional formats, and it could be argued that the flexibility offered by on-demand viewing was a value-add that had not been consistently provided by conventional meetings. Another silver lining for participants was the cost savings - fees for virtual conferences were often waived or lower than physical meetings, not to mention obviating the need for travel and accommodation expenses.

Attendance at organisational administrative meetings also improved with the hybrid format, as out-of-town members were able to participate without the added burden of organising travel.

The CSAMM AGM and First Council Meeting took place on 8th August 2020, utilising a hybrid platform, with Shangri-La Hotel, KL as the physical site, and Zoom for virtual attendees. This was made possible following approval from the Registrar of Societies to allow virtual AGMs. The Council bid farewell to Professor Dato' Dr Hanafiah Harunarashid, the immediate Past-President, Professor Dr Liew Ngoh Chin, and Professor Dato' Dr Subramaniam Muniandy who completed their terms in Council. I would like to express my deepest gratitude for their many contributions, that have helped the College evolves to its present status as an important stakeholder in surgical education. We also welcomed some new members to Council, who I believe will continue to champion the College's ideals.

In addition, we have restructured the Education Committee to be more representative of CSAMM's activities, separating the financial and implementation aspects, and creating new portfolios to facilitate our aspirations to be a key player in surgical education. These

new portfolios encompass training, courses and examinations.

I. MEDICAL STUDENT/EARLY CAREER ENGAGEMENT

It is never too early to engage with the potential next generation of surgeons. While the cancellation of our annual congress meant the usual medical students' session could not take place, CSAMM engaged through other student activities. The Malaysian Students' Surgical Society held their 2nd AGM virtually on 19 December 2020, and I was invited to speak on 'Undergraduate and Postgraduate Training - An Unforeseen Hiccup in 2020'. Other speakers included CSAMM Past-President, Professor Dato' Dr P Kandasami, who spoke of lecturers and students as new partners in learning; and CSAMM Council Member, Professor Datuk Dr Ismail Sagap who addressed new surgical technologies.

UM MedSoc, the Universiti Malaya medical students society, has been organising a series of career guidance webinars. I was pleased to engage with them on 15th January 2021 to provide perspective on general surgery as a career.

The IMU Surgical Society was also very active throughout 2020/21, conducting workshops on wound care, knotting and suturing. In addition, Professor Dato' Dr Hanafiah Harunarashid spoke on COVID-19: Role of Surgeons During A Pandemic and What to Expect After the MCO through a webinar on 15th May 2020. And in conjunction with Women's History Month 2021, Associate Professor Dr Farrah Hani Imran recorded a wonderfully diverse video highlighting Malaysian Surgical Leadership & Empowerment which was streamed on 15th March 2021.

Mymedik Academy is an organisation that provides learning opportunities to early career doctors. Two activities that involve CSAMM members in relation to surgical training and assessments were the Roadmap to Master of Surgery Training webinar on 21st February

2021, and a MedEx Preparatory Course on 12th June 2021.

The Opportunities by Pathways Webinar was organised by the Standing Committee of Medical Education (SCOME), the Society of MMA Medical Students (SMMAMS) and the International Federation of Medical Students' Associations (IFMSA). Students and early career doctors were able to learn about training pathways of various specialties locally as well as abroad. I was pleased to provide the local surgical training perspective.

II. SURGICAL TRAINING

1. Basic Surgical Training (BST) Programme

The Basic Surgical Training programme, based on the curriculum drafted by the National Curriculum Writing Group, was officially launched this year. Envisaged to address the pre-Masters gap in formalized training, it allows early career medical officers to work through and document their training, and democratize basic training to centres and trainers that might not yet fulfil requirements for advanced training. Targeted initially at medical officers in general surgery, the format can also be adapted for non-general surgical specialties. A series of webinars were conducted by members of the BST Committee to explain the programme prior to the launch, and special fees negotiated with AMM for enrolment of trainees as candidate members. We hope that by decentralizing the training sites while allowing centralized documentation of training evidence, the impact of the pandemic will be mitigated, while achieving the original aims of increasing training efficiency. A full report is provided later in this newsletter.

2. Inaugural Military Safe Surgery Saves Lives Seminar 2020

This seminar was organised by the surgical department at Hospital Angkatan Tentera Tuanku Mizan. Initially planned for the end of 2020 as a physical meeting, it was converted to a two-day webinar from 12th - 13th March 2021. CSAMM was represented by Professor Dato' Dr Hanafiah Harunarashid, who spoke on communication to save lives, while I addressed keeping calm and staying focused in the operating theatre.

III. REGULATION OF SPECIALISTS

Following its drafting of the Standards for Postgraduate Training of Medical Practitioners, the Malaysian Medical Council (MMC) conducted a workshop with specialty training stakeholders (Bengkel Penyelarasan Kepakaran Perubatan di Malaysia) on 10th - 11th April 2021 at the Pullman Bangsar. The objectives of this workshop were to standardize recognition and accreditation processes for all specialty training programmes, improve the workflow for specialist registration, refine Continuous Professional Development and reaccreditation criteria. stakeholders included representatives from the MMC, MQA (Malaysian Qualifications Agency), Malaysian Examinations Council, MoH (Ministry of Health), universities, and Academy of Medicine, including its member Colleges. Keynote lectures included a historical perspective of postgraduate medical programmes in Malaysia, delivered by Professor Dato' Dr Mahmud Mohd Nor, an eminent paediatric surgeon, who helped develop the clinical Masters' programmes. The legal and regulatory framework was also addressed in lectures and breakout groups, with the following references:



Medical Act 1971 (2012 Amendment) [Act 50]
Malaysian Qualifications Act 2007 [Act 679]
Medical Regulations 2017 - Regulations 22, 23, 27
Universities and University Colleges Act 1971 [Act 30]
Private Higher Educational Institutions Act 1996 [Act 555]

At the end of the workshop, the following key resolutions were proposed:

- Successful MQA accreditation of postgraduate specialist medical programmes by registered training providers will be required for recognition, regardless of whether the awarding body is locally based or abroad.
- 2. A mechanism for benchmarking overseas programmes will be developed.
- 3. A list of recognized training and qualifications will be reviewed and updated by MMC for the purpose of registering specialists.
- 4. The generic and specialty-specific MMC standards will be used to evaluate programmes.
- Procedures and guidelines for postgraduate specialist medical programmes must comply with the legal framework.

IV. INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATIONS

Despite restricted travel throughout 2020, CSAMM was able to sustain its international network through virtual platform activities. While many of our sister colleges deferred their annual scientific congresses to focus on the pandemic response, they continued to provide other educational opportunities, which CSAMM participated in. Ever more creative approaches will be needed in future to further develop such collaborations in training and education, research and other professional activities.

1. American College of Surgeons (ACS) Virtual Clinical Congress 2020

The American College of Surgeons elected to conduct their 2020 congress virtually from 4th - 8th October 2020. This included a virtual convocation ceremony, with Outgoing President, Professor Dr Valerie Rusch, addressing an international congregation. I was honoured to receive the Honarary Fellowship, only the second Malaysian after Professor Dato' Dr Yip Cheng Har, to be awarded thus. There are currently more than 50 Malaysians who are members of the ACS, a clear sign of the mutual benefits of this long-term relationship.

2. Philippine College of Surgeons (PCS) Virtual Congress 2020

The 76th Philippine College of Surgeons Congress took place from 6th - 9th December 2020. Conducted virtually, the theme was Surgery: Through the Looking Glass, and I was pleased to represent CSAMM at the Opening Ceremony. In addition to exploring innovations in surgery, the impact of the pandemic was also spotlighted. PCS President, Dr Jose Antonio M Salud, and his team is to be congratulated on a diverse and engaging programme.

3. College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka (CSSL) Annual Congress 2020, 4th - 6th November 2020

CSAMM continued its tradition of participating in CSSL's annual congress, albeit virtually this year. Despite significant challenges, President, Professor Dr Jayaindra Fernando and his team successfully organised their first virtual congress, which was well attended by both local and international participants. This was not surprising given the calibre of speakers. Among the plenaries delivered by international speakers were Professor Dr Ken Boffard (South Africa) speaking on Resuscitation Physiology in Trauma; Professor Dr Neil Mortensen (UK) on Anatomy of a Disaster; Professor Dr Michael Selwyn Griffin (UK) on Surgery and Competitive Sport - Are They Related? and Professor Dr Andrew Hill (New Zealand) on Work Life Balance. I was privileged to speak on Occupational Health Hazards for Surgeons - Towards a Gendered Understanding, and had the opportunity to hear Mr Johaan Peries expound on the parallels between surgical decision-making and those involved in scaling Mount Everest.

4. Induction Ceremony of the 39th President, CSSL, and Golden Jubilee, 15th January 2021

I was able to deliver a congratulatory message on behalf of CSAMM at the induction ceremony of the 39th President of CSSL, Professor Dr Srinath Chandrasekara. Professor Srinath is a urologist at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura Faculty of Medicine, in Negugoda. This was also an occasion to celebrate their Golden Jubilee, and I was able to wish them even more success in the coming years.

5. Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh (RCSEd) International Webinars

The International Office of RCSEd ran a series of webinars addressing the regional impact of various surgically-related issues. On 28th April 2021, Professor Dato' Dr Hanafiah Harunarashid hosted a session that discussed the impact of the pandemic on training

and examinations. I had the opportunity to speak regarding the impact on training while Mr Zahid Raza, the MRCSEd Examinations Convenor tackled the impact on international examinations. My thanks go out to RCSEd President, Professor Dr Michael Selwyn Griffin and his team for further cementing our longstanding collaborations.

6. Bangladesh College of Physicians and Surgeons (BCPS)

BCPS is responsible for conducting qualifying Fellowship examinations for surgeons in Bangladesh, and has recently begun inviting senior members of CSAMM to participate as external examiners. Council member Professor Datuk Dr Ismail Sagap was able to represent our College at the last diet before the COVID-19 Movement Control Order was enforced, on 21st - 25th January 2020, and we hope this collaboration will continue once the pandemic restrictions are lifted.

7. Association of Surgeons of India (ASI) The 80th Annual Conference of ASI (ASICON 2020) was held from 16th - 19th December 2020. Originally planned as a physical meeting in Visakhapatnam, ASI President, Professor Dr Raghu Ram and his team transitioned to a hybrid platform to allow the programme to continue. The Chief Guest at the Convocation Ceremony was His Excellency Dr Lotay Shering, the Prime Minister of Bhutan. A surgeon himself, he still continues to operate in underserved areas of Bhutan on weekends. In his address, he expounded on how operating with a scalpel parallels operating with a pen in governance of a nation. There were many important lessons to be learned from the leader of the Happiest Nation in the World.

While our nascent plans for ASI and CSAMM exchange programmes have been put on hold for now, I am pleased that we are still able to collaborate virtually. It was my honour to deliver the Dr PN Joshi Special Guest Lecture, sharing my thoughts on why curing fistula in ano is the Holy Grail of coloproctology. Dr PN Joshi was a founder member and Past President of the Association of Colon and Rectal Surgeons of India (ACRSI), whose name is synonymous with this specialty in India, and it was indeed an honour considering previous guest lecturers were stalwarts such as Stanley Goldberg, John Northover and Francis Seow-Choen.

8. International Surgical Society (ISS)

CSAMM had been gearing up to host the International Surgical Week in 2021, but as with so

many other activities, circumstances dictated that it be postponed to 2022. However, to maintain interest, ISS is planning to organise a series of webinars throughout 2021, one of which will be delivered by CSAMM. Our webinar will be themed Surgical Outreach, and I will moderate the session. Speakers representing CSAMM will be Professor Dato' Dr Hanafiah Harunarashid, Professor Datuk Dr Ismail Sagap, Brigadier General Dato' Dr Shabbar Husain Fazle Abbas and Dr Kim Tan.

9. Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland (RCSI) Millin and Charter Meetings

The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland conducts two important meetings annually. The Millin Meeting, named in honor of Terence Millin, a urologist and past RCSI President, is usually a stand-alone meeting focusing on research. The meeting culminates with the Millin Lecture, delivered by a senior trainee or young Consultant. This year's 43rd Millin Lecture was delivered by Mr Colin Peirce, a colorectal surgeon from Limerick, who spoke on 'Electrodes to Robots - Evidence Based Change in Surgical Practice'.

The Charter Meeting is usually part of Charter Week, which celebrates the heritage of the College in commemoration of the Royal Charter of King George III in 1784. Traditionally, this involves a gathering of Fellows, Members, Alumni, Faculty, Students, Staff and the broader healthcare community in Ireland and overseas.

In light of pandemic restrictions, the planned meetings for 2020 were postponed and combined, taking place instead from 4th - 6th February 2021, on a virtual platform. RCSI President, Professor Dr Ronan O'Connell, kindly invited me to participate in the President's Symposium on Meaningful Surgical Research, which took place on Thursday 4th February 2021. Other speakers in this session were Professor Dr Soren Laurberg from Arhus, Denmark who is the doyen of surgical research in Jutland, Professor Dr Dion Morton, who established the Birmingham Surgical Trials Consortium, Professor Dr Sara Marshall of the Wellcome Trust, UK, and Professor Dr Aoife Lowery, NUIG, Galway, Ireland. I shared my thoughts on key enablers for integrating research into clinical training.

10. Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS) 89th Annual Scientific Congress

This congress was postponed from 2020 to take place instead on a hybrid platform from 10th - 14th May

2021. The physical component took place at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre, Melbourne, Australia. I was able to participate virtually at the Convocation Ceremony on 15th May 2021, at the kind invitation of RACS President, Mr Anthony Sparnon. Some highlights of the congress included talks addressing the art of surgery: The Art of Being a Creative Surgeon, The Art of Healing, The Art of Communication in a Crisis, and The Art Behind Innovation.

V. EXAMINATIONS AND COURSES

Unfortunately, the pandemic took its toll on the conduct of examinations and courses. The local Clinical Masters examinations in May 2020 were deferred to November 2020, resulting in delayed exit of surgical specialists, negatively impacting staffing of surgical services nationwide. The entrance examination, MedEx, was repeatedly postponed, and eventually transitioned to an online platform to be delivered in 2021. Entrance evaluations for the 2021 intake were also deferred, resulting in the June 2021 intake being deferred to December 2021. This will have significant implications for surgical services, particularly in teaching hospitals in the short term, but in the long term, national services will also be affected.

International examinations, including the MRCS and JSCFE, have been put on hold. Trainees in specialties that rely entirely on such assessments have had their progess delayed. Similarly, courses and workshops for practical skills have been disrupted, placing further obstacles to

progress through programmes that require such courses to be completed. Clearly, given that these disruptions are unlikely to resolve soon, we will need to reinvent the way we train the next generation of surgeons.

The revised delivery of Science of Tissue Management (SoTM) courses is one example. An addendum to the SoTM Memorandum of Understanding between CSAMM and Johnson & Johnson was signed on 17th December 2020 for the provision of related educational material through a digital platform. Following this, training of SoTM trainers was converted to a series of webinars for each of the modules, before the hands-on sessions were conducted in a decentralized fashion. Although labour-intensive, this may be the way forward for workshops where a physical presence is unavoidable.

VI. THE MEDICAL ACADEMIES' BUILDING

The purchase of the proposed site for the Medical Academies' building was formalised on 20th July 2020, with CSAMM represented by our trustee, Dato' Yeoh Poh Hong. Located at plot 8C8 in Putrajaya, it is part of a broader plan to develop a medical hub in the surrounding region. The joint Academies Management Committee has appointed a Building Task Force, chaired by Tan Sri Ridzwan Bakar, and thus far, architects and project manager have been appointed. Although the original design has had to be amended due to budget constraints, I believe this new home will still fulfil our vision of being a central hub for educational and other activities for healthcare professionals.

54th MSCM / CSAMM ASC 2021

This year's Congress will be held in conjunction with the 54th Malaysia-Singapore Congress of Medicine. The theme for this Congress is "Disruptive Forces - Reimagining Our Future". Indeed, the pandemic has been disruptive; forcing us to adjust and adapt to the new norm. This will be the focus of our discussion at this congress.

The Organising Committee has decided along with the support of both the Academy Council and College Council to run the 2021 Congress virtually.

Sabah had the great privilege of hosting Professor Dr April Camilla Roslani, President of CSAMM, and Professor Datuk Dr Ismail Sagap, Council Member of CSAMM for the Sabah Roadshow from 13th to 16th March 2020 in conjunction with Sabah Surgery 2020 conference. This strategy to engage directly with surgeons and surgical trainees at their home ground provides an ideal platform to introduce the initiatives by the College to promote a structured surgical training and education programme, as well as dialogue and networking.

The intent of the roadshow was in tune with the theme of the surgical conference, "The Trainee to Surgeon Continuum: Connecting the Dots", and addressed four subject matters: (i) Basic Surgical Training, (ii) Advance Surgical Training, (iii) Surgical Skills Courses and (iv) CSAMM Membership.

Professor Dr April Camilla Roslani clearly outlined the national surgical training curriculum and introduced the e-learning platform for junior surgical trainees embarking on their surgical career pathway. She also clarified the role of MedEx, MRCS examinations, and surgical skills courses prior to entry into the Master of General Surgery programme. She addressed the training opportunities for junior trainees seeking the parallel pathway into cardiothoracic surgery and urology, as well as fellowships for general surgeons furthering their training in subspecialty fields. This was an interactive session that provided the perfect opportunity for attendees to raise issues and clarify doubts concerning their career pathways.

As a final touch, Professor Dr April Camilla Roslani urged surgical trainees and surgeons to enrol as members of the College, a professional body and advocate that represents the fraternity and is fundamental in moulding the future of surgical services and training in the country.



Hospital Tawau (400-bedded) serves a large catchment area of patients living on the east coast districts of Sabah including Semporna, Lahad Datu and Kunak with a population of 1 million.

Professor Dr April Camilla Roslani and Professor Datuk Dr Ismail Sagap were hosted by Mr Khasnizal Abdul Karim, the Head of General Surgery, and his team of surgeons, medical officers and house officers. Professor Dr April Camilla Roslani delivered her presentation followed by an interactive Q&A session with the participants.






Sandakan (16th March 2020)



2. UKMMC Breast Cancer Updates

This series of Webinars / Lectures was organised by UKMMC for all B&E surgical trainees as well as members of the B&E Chapter as part of CME to increase and update members on the latest treatment guidelines in the management of breast cancer. It runs as a series of lecture often on Saturday morning from 9.00am to 12.30pm. Up to April 2021, a total of 7 sessions have been successfully organised.

In view of the ongoing pandemic, the Annual Scientific Congress for the College of Surgeons will be held in August 2021 as a Virtual meeting. As part of our commitment in CME, the B&E Chapter will be having one symposium session on breast disease related topic and one meet-the-expert session on an Endocrine topic. We hope to continue supporting the College with relevant topics pertaining to B&E Surgery in the future.

As part of CSR, the members of B&E Chapter together with College of Radiology has released an article on recommendation for breast imaging, vaccination and management of lymph node enlargement in patients COVID-19 with recent vaccination. recommendation aimed to reduce patient anxiety as well as a guide to health care providers in Malaysia. The COVID-19 vaccination can result in lymph node swelling in the axillary region of the injected arm, for breast cancer patient undergoing surveillance monitoring this finding may cause some confusion to both patient as well as the health care provider. We felt that these guidelines were necessary to answer these questions related to the patients, namely breast cancer patients undergoing surveillance monitoring. We also hope this article will avoid further delay in vaccination amongst breast cancer patients due to a lack of understanding on the safety as well as side effects of the vaccination. We hope to encourage patients to take up the COVID-19 vaccination programme in line with the government aspiration.

We hope the second half of 2021 will be bright and more promising for all.

Sarawak Surgeons Report for 2020

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought global travel to a standstill with many countries still having closed borders and reeling from the coronavirus. The lockdown has caused many global meetings and surgical educational activities postponed or rescheduled. This is a brief review of how Sarawak surgical services have endured through this unprecedented period.

At the beginning of 2020, before the pandemic hit, there was a proposal to organise a monthly Sarawak Surgeons Meeting where invited speakers could present on specific topics to broaden the horizons of surgeons and surgical trainees in the state. The proposal was to have monthly 'physical' meetings over 12 months. A web-based meeting was not deemed ideal as initial surveys among the surgeons showed poor interest in attending webinars of subspecialty interest. There were concerns of poor attendance as there were not many topics of general surgical interest. It is our hope that these meetings will start once the pandemic eases off.

In an effort to disseminate information and updates among the surgical fraternity in Sarawak, a WhatsApp group was established on 2nd September 2020. The group has 78 members with qualified surgeons from all sectors (Ministry of Health, Universiti Malaysia Sarawak and private) and different disciplines. Through this WhatsApp group, surgeons who prior to this had rarely received updates regarding the activities organised by the College of Surgeons now were receiving regular updates. The Annual Report of the College, Berita CSM and other announcements are also disseminated via this group as well.

Sarawak has unique geography as a large state on the island of Borneo. Access to surgical services remains a challenge for a variety of reasons including poor roads and the sheer size of the state with most major hospitals located in major towns located along the Western coast. Thus, the population who live in the interior of Sarawak have difficulty obtaining basic surgical services in a timely fashion and this issue has been identified as a major area for development under

the global surgery initiative. Through the College, we have engaged various corporations, governmental and non-governmental organisations, to help coordinate outreach programmes to perform health screening and provide intervention in the past. However, these activities have been limited due this pandemic.

The pandemic has further compromised transportation infrastructure within the state. Commercial flights are now restricted, and patient transfers are becoming increasingly difficult. Multiple surgical services have had to adapt and use new technology to enable assessment and remote consultation to reduce unnecessary transfers and optimize readily available surgical services in the state. This framework has been embraced especially by the Neurosurgical Department which has helped elevate delivery of neurosurgical care to patients in a timely manner.



Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (UNIMAS) which is a medical school based in Kuching had the final year professional examinations in December 2020. Traditionally, external examiners are routinely invited from both the government and private healthcare institutions. However, as the exam was scheduled during the height of the Movement Control Order (MCO), local surgeons from the state of Sarawak were the main core of examiners as external examiners from outside the state were unable to travel. The exam was conducted smoothly due to the high level of cooperation among surgeons in the state.

UNIMAS also has the honour of being an accredited overseas examination centre for the MRCS Part B

Chapter of Upper GI Surgeons

The Chapter of Upper GI Surgeons was officially launched at the Opening Ceremony of the Annual Scientific Congress of the College of Surgeons on 11th May 2018 in Ipoh, Perak. Members of the Chapter have been involved in the organisation of activities and events of the Malaysian Upper GI Surgical Society (MUGIS).

MUGIS was formed in 2012 when members of the informal 'Upper GI Club' decided to formally register a Society with the aim of advancing Upper GI Surgical training and education in Malaysia. With an initial 16 founding members, the Society has grown to more than 50 members. Full membership is awarded only to qualified surgeons while allied membership is available for surgical trainees and allied health personnel.

The Society organises annual scientific meeting where surgeons and trainees can meet the leading Upper GI Surgeons from both the Western and Eastern hemispheres to better understand the challenges and controversies in the management of upper GI diseases. There also many smaller training activities such as endoscopic workshops, laparoscopic workshops as well as cadaveric workshops that have been organised each year.

Through regular collaborations, the Society has established long lasting association with multiple international societies such as the International Society for Diseases of the Esophagus (ISDE) and the ASEAN Upper GI Surgical Society (USAN) to name a few. These collaborative efforts have created lasting partnerships that enable the transfer of knowledge and the exchange of ideas across borders. Trainees have also been sent abroad for exposure and this has benefited the provision of upper GI Surgical services in Malaysia.

In 2019, MUGIS collaborated with the ASEAN Upper GI Surgical Society in holding an inaugural meeting in Ho Ci Minh City, Vietnam on 28th and 29th of June. This was a meeting that saw Upper GI Surgical teams from Vietnam. Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia, Philippines coming together. The following month, MUGIS collaborated with the Johor Bahru Surgical Society in the inaugural Johor Surgical Conference that saw more than 300 participants from the Southern end of the Peninsula of Malaysia. The 8th Annual Scientific Meeting of the Society was held in the Royale Chulan Hotel, Bukit Bintang, Kuala Lumpur with a distinguished international faculty from Hong Kong, Japan, Vietnam, India, and Singapore.

There were also workshops aimed at surgical trainees such as the Asian Novel Bio-Imaging and Intervention Group (ANBIIG) Endoscopy Workshop and also Masterclass sessions such as the Johor Bahru Upper GI Masterclass that saw eager participation especially from exam going trainees. The Society has created opportunities for all level of participants to enrich and advance Upper GI surgical services.

Sadly, with the pandemic, the Society has had little opportunity for hands-on training in 2020. But a silver-lining for the year is that the Society is now a leading stakeholder in Upper GI Subspecialty training with a new unified and streamlined training programme that is a collaborative effort between the Ministry of Health and the Universities. This partnership will ultimately benefit the trainees and ensure the highest standards of training. The Society and the Chapter will always continue to champion the advancement of Upper GI Surgery in Malaysia.

Chapter of Women Surgeons

INTRODUCTION

The Chapter of Women Surgeons, founded in 2018, was established to inspire, encourage and enable women in surgery to realize their professional and personal goals. This publication represents two of our goals: advancing the highest standards of competence and promoting professional growth and development.

Although the first Malaysian female doctor, Tan Sri Dr Salma Ismail, qualified in 1949, Malaysian women surgeons only made an appearance in the 1970s. Pioneers included Dato' Dr Suseela Nair, the first woman surgeon to qualify in 1971, who went on to become Malaysia's only female national head of general surgical services thus far in 1988; Emeritus Professor Dr Freda Meah, who qualified in 1976, and went on to become the nation's first Endocrine surgeon, as well as first female Academic Surgical Head of Department, also in 1988; Madam Leela Mala Perumal, and Madam Sunitha Camilla Vethavanam.

Over the next two decades, the number of women surgeons remained small, and many female trainees found it difficult to identify appropriate role models and advisors to facilitate their surgical education, particularly while trying to balance life beyond the work environment. Pioneer academic surgeons, such as Professor Emeritus Dr Freda Meah and Professor Emeritus Dato' Dr Yip Cheng Har (the first female CSAMM President, from 2010 - 2013), helped to demonstrate the feasibility of academic surgery as a career for women in the 1980s, through their roles in undergraduate and then-nascent Master of Surgery programmes.

Changes in societal roles and expectations, for both men and women, meant that obstacles and challenges that were hitherto predominantly faced by women, such as managing childcare, are now increasingly impacting men. Non-technical skills are increasingly recognized as significantly influencing patient outcomes, yet had not previously been emphasized in training. It is hoped that the wisdom and wealth of experience that we and our predecessors have gained, distilled in this publication, will be useful for both male and female trainees.

Report on CSAMM ASC 2016: Inaugural Event Women In Surgery Symposium, Shangri-La Kuala Lumpur The 2016 AGM/Annual Scientific Meeting/Congress of the College of Surgeons, Academy of Medicine of Malaysia took place from the 13th to 15th May 2016 in the Shangri-La Hotel, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

As per the Program book: The theme, taken from the Greek mythology "Between Scylla and Charybdis", describes the dilemma of today's surgeons when they face critical moments in "Navigating the Treacherous Waters of Modern Surgery" whereby patients' lives are at risk. This ASM covers several areas of interests. A symposium is dedicated specifically to "Women in Surgery". Issues regarding the dearth of women in surgery will be addressed in an inaugural half-day symposium.

The first event was a surgical debate in the Sarawak Room on 14th May 2016, entitled "We need more women in surgery". Proposers: Reena Prhiya Ramasamy, Dina Syazana Ho, April Camilla Roslani. Opposers: Joshua Ling En Sheng, Ismail Sagap.

The inaugural Symposium was entitled Reversing The Numbers, on Sunday 15th May 2016, from 0730 to 1300 at the Johor Room.

To start with, they spoke on the differences and challenges in training, role models and the influences in their career.

For the medical students who are interested, they shared advice on preparations during housemanship, including getting involved in research and networking. They spoke on the assistance and encouragement they had received over the years from their family, colleagues and superiors; about trying to keep a work/life balance, coping strategies and keeping mental health in check.

The final segment featured "golden advice" to future surgical trainees.
